Pre-requisite: EL281 English for Sociologists and Anthropologists I

Course Description:

This course is designed to improve students' four basic English skills (reading, listening, writing, and speaking) related to higher levels of sociology and anthropology. Special emphasis is placed on reading and writing advanced levels texts with issues of academic interest and awareness of professional ethics.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to

- read articles in the fields of sociology and anthropology in an advanced level;
- perform expository writing essays in sociology and anthropology;
- promote autonomous as well as student-centered learning;
- raise an awareness of ethics and moral values in the fields of sociology and anthropology.
