



Language Institute Thammasat University EL 331 English for Political Scientists II Course Syllabus Semester 1/2023

Course Description

Study of current and ongoing national and international political issues. Student-centered analysis and English discussion of political issues. Practice in summarizing, presenting, and critical thinking. Development of self-directed language learning using authentic political materials.

Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes (COLOs)

Objective 1: Students will be able to deliver original, accurate and concise written and oral reports on an ongoing political issue.

- Outcome 1.1: Summarize in writing the most recent significant news developments of an issue.
- **Outcome 1.2:** Summarize orally the most recent significant news developments of an issue.

Objective 2: Students will be able to explain the relevance of an issue to previous PO courses.

Outcome 2.1: Write or present orally an analysis of how an ongoing political issue can be understood in terms of theories, models, principles or approaches in the field of political science.

Objective 3: Students will be able to present an informed and well-argued position on a current political issue.

- **Outcome 3.1**: Think critically and express an opinion and a recommended solution to a current political issue.
- **Outcome 3.2:** Present in writing or orally, a review and analysis of the major developments in an issue over the semester and defend a position and recommendation.

Objective 4: Students will be able to achieve project-based learning benefits and learn with higher motivation, greater interest and confidence through authentic English materials of their own choice and at a pace and proficiency level they are allowed to manage.

- Outcome 4.1: Students self-select topics and source materials at a language complexity they choose.
- Outcome 4.2: Students opt for their preferred productive language skill.
- **Outcome 4.3**: English language study and vocabulary learning are self-directed.

Course Contents

- 1. Exploration of a current, ongoing political or social issue in Thailand, regionally, or globally
- 2. Practice in summarizing news developments, analyzing, thinking critically and expressing opinions
- 3. Explaining the significance of an issue in terms of previous Political Science courses taken
- 4. Practice in preparing an academic research report
- 5. Vocabulary and language competency development in the field of Political Science

Course Materials

Students enrolled in the course will receive a code to join a learning platform that provides access to course materials, assignment details and grading results. Instructors may provide additional supplemental materials during the course.
